Strength of Silence

One of the unique aspects of the priesthood, as I seem to have touched upon recently on a number of occasions, is the self-motivating factor. Often, the "success" of a priest, be it on earth or in Heaven (I'd like to think) comes from the time and effort put in to things that he "could" or "should" do.

Prayer is the same way....and really, much of life is as well. It is about the time, the effort, the desire to do things. Recently, at St. Mary's, we just completed a Bible Study that was focused on prayer and that emanated from a movie that we watched: "War Room."

It was a Hollywood release, with the male lead a local to Cleveland. It had the bells, whistles, and production quality of any other 2015 movie, but its center was Christ and prayer.

The conscience of the movie was a character named "Ms. Cleo". She was a repentant Christian, who described and lived the type of prayer any Christian should seek to be part of...especially in the comfort of home.

For me, it awakened feelings to the time in life when I was the most prayerful.

Against all odds, it was actually in my late



teens and early twenties!

I happened to have fallen in love with the girl that would become my wife, but she lived 206 miles away from my parent's home in Western Massachusetts. At the time, I was driving a 1999 Chevrolet Malibu. It was the bare-bones model— automatic nothing, no cruise control, no cd player, no tape deck. And to top it off, it had to have the worst radio antenna in all recorded history. It could get FM stations from one or two towns away and not a hint of AM.

Needless to say, 206 miles happened once a month, each way, in mostly silence. At first, it drove me nuts...but love makes you do funny things. Eventually, it seemed like I memorized Interstate 84 from Hartford to Mt. Cobb: the turns, the signs, how many minutes away each exit was.

Of course, this silence also led to incredible prayer. It came to that I looked forward to the drive. I would spend the first hour or so planning my life—schoolwork, my job, future plans. I'd review, debate, talk to myself, maybe make a phone call (roaming was big \$\$\$ in 2002).

I would pray. And why not? Now I know that "Even a fool who keeps silent is considered wise; when he closes his lips, he is deemed intelligent" (Proverbs 17:28). My internal debate throughout the second half of my college life was whether or not I should take a job out of college or go to seminary. My prayers centered around

this conundrum, really making me wonder if that meant that God actually was not calling me if it was such a debate.

My internal turmoil would really make me squirm. Sometimes, the time of prayer left me more confused and frustrated. Eventually though, it provided clarity. It might have taken a few dozen hours, but it was real and powerful.

Twenty pounds and some grey hair later, I go back to my relationship with silence. And now that I know a thing or two, it is more eagerness than frustration. After all, "The Lord will fight for you, and you have only to be silent" (Exodus 14:14).

St. Mary's is on a main drag, right on the border of Parma and Cleveland. Thousands of cars drive by every day, hundreds of loud, lumbering trucks as well that shake the place. The flagpole shakes violently in a heavy wind, buckles and rope clanging everywhere.

I've found the spot in the church where I like to pray the most. Recently, I've thought about how *War Room* showed how to blot out distractions. The advice was to find our place and to work on becoming better in prayer, whether it was by taking notes, setting up reminders, or even shutting out previous things in life that you thought important.

The good Lord knows that I am laughably, embarrassingly, depressingly far from perfect...but I'm trying! Embrace silence! It is an incredible feeling to get real, prayerful dialogue with God, as fleeting as it may be. Hey, it is the least we can do, to try to get closer to the one who is the author of all that is good! *Fr. Jason*

The 2017 parish officers of St. Mary's parish were installed at Holy Mass on Sunday, January 8, 2017.



BIBLICAL STEWARDSHIP: THE TRUTH ABOUT MONEY: Biblical stewardship requires that a Christian view money differently from the way the secular world views it. The secular world equates affluence with success and happiness. Therefore, society constantly struggles to acquire as much wealth as possible. The Bible, however, exposes the worthlessness of such a struggle by revealing the truth about money. The Psalms proclaim, "But man, despite his riches, does not endure; he is like the beasts that perish" *Psalm 49:12*. No matter how much one struggles for wealth, death still awaits because money cannot add anything to one's life. Let us show that our heart is with Jesus by how we choose to support His Church - see *Matthew 6:21*



compliment them on their appearance, all these things can help to really turn around someone who's having a bad day. Additionally, research has shown that the very act of doing something for someone else gives us a chemical high, a higher one, in fact, than if something had been done for us. There was a wise man who once shared a concept "Do not think of those who are in need, such as panhandlers, as seeking charity. They are, instead, providing a service. A service that allows you to get your fix of feel good while simultaneously paying someone for providing it." It may be a bit more open-minded than some people are ready for, but it certainly helps bring things into light!

How to celebrate Random Acts Of Kindness Day

Random Acts of Kindness come in all forms, large and small, and how you choose to perform yours is entirely up to you. It can start with dropping a bit of change in the cup of the homeless person along the street, or considering the time of year, providing a warm blanket to see them through. 
Buttermilk Spoon Bread


