### So...What do we do?

It is a healthy exercise for any group or organization to take stock in how it is performing in terms of its goals, its mission statement, and per its purpose. For St. Mary's, as we have continued through the Easter Season, with the glory of that April 1, 2018 Easter morning fading, the lilies succumbing after a solid 5 weeks, and the hymns now beginning to shift towards Marian and summer hymns, it is as good a time as any for us to do so.

On the Day of Ascension, this year held on May 10, a perfect 40 days after the Resurrection, we hear what the call of Jesus was to his disciples. Of course, this was the inspiration of my writing today! It is from Mark 16 - "Go into the whole world and proclaim the gospel to every creature. Whoever believes and is baptized will be saved; whoever does not believe will be condemned. These signs will accompany those who believe: in my name they will drive out demons, they will speak new languages. They will pick up serpents with their hands, and if they



drink any deadly thing, it will not harm them. They will lay hands on the sick, and they will recover."

Ok then! Some of this holds quite strong...but I don't think I'm going to gulp down a snifter of turpentine because Jesus gave the power to people centuries ago to survive this. Seriously: In addition to what Jesus commissioned at His Ascension, we have the Corporal Works of Mercy, as outlined by the Church and taught to us in our Catechism and based on Matthew 25:31-46. They are what we should do to/for anyone as if he or she was Jesus Christ Himself. There are seven (of course there are seven!): Feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, shelter the homeless, visit the sick, visit the prisoners, bury the dead, and give alms to the poor/clothe the needy.

When I think of my personal and our collective ministry to God's people at St. Mary's, I ask you to think to yourself: are you and I doing enough? I mean, the answer could always be that we could and should do more, but...do we at least hit all seven?

Feed the hungry and give drink to the thirsty? I'd like to think we do ok. We cook a hot meal monthly, accompany with drink, and have backpacks full of

3 days of food. Any good priest worth his salt will give alms to the poor - be it money for a hard case or something else.

Give alms to the poor/clothe the naked? Well, over the last two years, St. Mary's has collected thousands of articles of clothing and donated them to the surrounding community.

Shelter the homeless? Well, admittedly, that is a tough one-perhaps too tough for a small parish like ours. We've helped out places in the past that provide this ministry, but this is the toughest.

Visit the sick and the prisoners? Of course. Some parishes even have a visiting ministry where groups of people visit and offer prayer in a communal way. HIPPA rules have made this a bit tougher however. And a visit to someone in prison? No one has done anything so bad that the grace of God should be denied. And if a parishioner? Who could use a visit more than him or her?

Finally, burying the dead. Perhaps the "easiest" for a church to do, because it is understood that this is part of the church...I suppose, the last part. I was asked the rules for burying the dead recently. Simply - it is prioritized. It should always be done in a timely manner, and should usurp things on a parish schedule when necessary.

As a priest with a family, some of


these can be tough. It is the sort of thing that churches with celibate clergy embrace: that the family of a clergyman is his parish. And you know, there is some truth and beauty to that. Not that any married PNC priest would deny a late night visit to the Emergency Room or plan a funeral only on one particular day of the week...but family responsibilities can make it tough! For the first 1000 or so years, this was the reality of all Christian Clergyman (priests). It was having a parish and having a family. It wasn't until a decree at the Second Lateran Council in 1139 that priests were called

to be celibate, and this was reaffirmed in 1563 at the Council of Trent. (I always imagined a mass exodus from the seminaries when this newsbomb was dropped!)

In all, let us take stock of ourselves and our roles at our parish - are we treating each person who walks through our doors as if he or she were Jesus Christ? Fr. Jason
