Walking with the Saints

The first of November brings about a tide of change on the calendar of the Catholic Church. This year is an especially clear example of that - As always, the Solemnity of All Saints welcomes us on the 1st and the Commemoration of All Souls follows upon the 2nd.

Sundays begin to tell a different story as well - after a solid run of mostly Ordinary Time Sundays from the end of June, the energy really shifts this month - the first two Sundays are the 32nd and 33rd Sunday of Ordinary Time, which specifically speak to eschatology, or teaching on the end-times. November 20th is the Solemnity of Christ the King and the 27th is the First Sunday of Advent.

In that same church calendar, we honor saints daily- some more popular than others. I make a point to either preach or write about some saints each year to show how we can live our everyday lives while recalling the lives of the Saints...just in time to continue observing All Saints throughout this month. However, I wanted to be more practical and include some prayers to go along with the saint...

If you are anything like me, the alarm clock is the enemy- we have Saint Vitus to pray through as he is the patron saint of oversleeping. His emblem is the rooster (of course it is) and there even is a short prayer on his behalf we can say before bed: **"For whom the angels danced, grant me a rested body And an alert mind in the morning."**

That morning cup of coffee is always made better by acknowledging St. Drogo of Sebourg, patron saint of coffee. And since it is 2022, we are probably enjoying that coffee while staring at our phones for the



first time that day...Gabriel the Archangel is the patron saint of all messages delivered (and of the telephone). But you know... there is a patron saint of smartphones. That would be St. Lucy...who had her eyes gouged out of her head in holy martyrdom in the early 300's. I suppose we are doing the same with these things, just at a bit of a slower pace...

Saint Christopher is the patron saint of trav-

eling and worthy of intercession on our daily commute. Perhaps after we start our engines: **"St Christopher, warrior saint and protector of travelers guard me in my commute this day. That I may arrive safely at work and return home at end of day. You waded through dangerous waters With others depending on your strength for safety. Bring me unharmed through the stress and danger of traffic. Grant me patience with other drivers and help me carry any inconvenience with grace. Turn my frustration into a prayer for their safe travel. Ride with me as I travel so that it will be a time of prayer and reflection on the journey God has set me on, from this moment until I return to home. Amen."**

And the good Lord knows that not every work day was created equal! Sometimes we have one of *those days*. St. Dymphna, an Irish Martyr of the 7th Century, is the patroness of mental health, stress, and anxiety. Should we need it, may we call upon her intercession like this:

"Good Saint Dymphna, great wonder-worker in every affliction of mind and body, I humbly implore your powerful intercession with Jesus through Mary, the Health of the Sick, in my present need. (Mention it.) Saint Dymphna, martyr of purity, patroness of those who suffer with nervous and mental afflictions, beloved child of Jesus and Mary, pray to Them for me and obtain my request. Amen."

Sometimes, days run long and either by choice or by treat, we end up in the drive-

thru line to get some unhealthy food on our way home. Saint Benedict of Nursia, the patron saint of all Europe and a 5th/6th century saint is also the patron saint of protection against...food poisoning. He was the founder of Western Monasticism and, well, though it may be a bit intense, sometimes we know when we are taking a bit of a risk when it comes to what we eat! **“Admirable Saint and Doctor of Humility, you practiced what you taught, assiduously praying for God's glory and lovingly fulfilling all work for God and the benefit of all human beings. You know the many physical dangers that surround us today often caused or occasioned by human inventions. Guard us against poisoning of the body as well as of mind and soul, and thus be truly a "Blessed" one for us. Amen.”**



Finally, if we are relaxed on our couches and easy chairs at the end of a long day and de-

side to catch the Cavs game, Saint Sebastian, the patron saint of athletes and sports may be called upon to grant the strength (fortitude) to keep your soul calm, even if your fandom leads you otherwise: **“O Lord, grant us the spirit of fortitude, so that guided by the example of the martyr St. Sebastian, we may learn to bear witness to the Christian Faith and patiently support the sufferings of life. Through Christ Our Lord. Amen.”**

With the other prayers we know to use through the day and a bit of extra guidance from some otherwise obscure saints, may we walk with them and call upon their protection and guidance from above!

The XXVI PNCC General Synod & 125th Anniversary

October was a month to remember not only for our parish of St. Mary's, but in the life of our holy Polish National Catholic Church. The XXVI General Synod was called to take place from Tuesday, October 18, until Friday, October 21, 2022. The first order of business on Tuesday night was the nomination for the Office of Bishop. The pool of candidates are all PNCC priests. Though one accepted a nomination, a withdrawal came the following morning. The hierarchy of the Church promises creativity in adjusting for the non-election of a bishop over the next four years, with a plan to be presented in two years at the diocesan synods.

The preponderance of the business-at-hand at any synod is the review of reports and this synod was no exception. While the National Church utilized a free service to email the reports, they still needed to be open for dis-

cussion and accepted. Some reports that received particular discussion were the PNCC-Roman Catholic Dialogue, Vocations, Convo/National United Youth Association, Budget, and Constitution Commission. The Constitution was delicately adjusted to be a more accessible document with a large majority vote. A new Youth Commission was established.

Mike Wisniewski and Elaine Ploskonka were the two elected delegates representing St. Mary's. Barbara Wisniewski was a delegate appointed by the PNU for her district, Deacon Jim Ploskonka attended as a guest and Fr. Jason attended as pastor.

Holy Mass was celebrated on Wednesday afternoon of the Synod as it was the "original" opening day for the event. It was to be attended by all synod attendees.

The synod concluded on Friday afternoon, with some taking the opportunity to leave for home and Sunday commitments. However, many stayed for Saturday morning's Holy Mass at St. Stanislaus Cathedral which was to observe the 125th Anniversary of the organization of the PNCC. All Bishops of the Union of Scranton (PNCC and Nordic Catholic Church) concelebrated the Mass. Deacon Jim was the Deacon of the Mass, proclaiming the Gospel, while Fr. Jason served as a Master of Ceremony. It was a memorable event.

A banquet followed back at the hotel to honor the anniversary. A delicious luncheon was served



while remarks were heard from many of those prelates in attendance. Due to time constraints most of the St. Mary's contingent hit the road shortly after dinner concluded in order to prepare for Sunday worship back in Ohio, some 6 hours away.

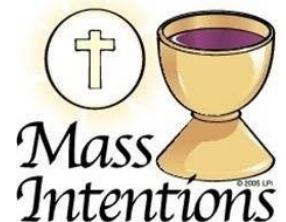

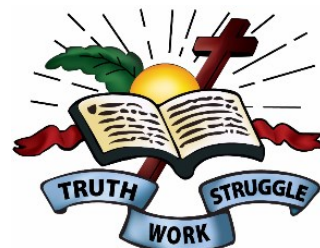
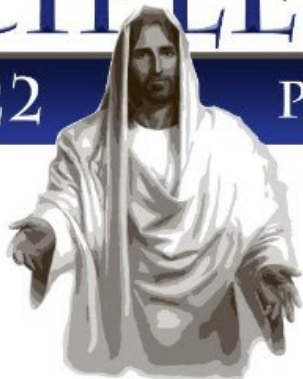

November 2022 – Saints Cyril & Methodius

During the month of November as we continue our focus of Being Eucharistic People – we reflect on Saints Cyril and Methodius “the Apostles to the Slavs”.

Scripture: Mark 6:34-44

Reflection and Action Item:

St. Cyril and his brother St. Methodius were born in the early 9th century in what is today Greece within a devout Christian family. They both dedicated their lives to Christ within the Church living this out many different ways - including Cyril's being a professor in a University and Methodius becoming the abbot of a monastery - but they are best known for being “the Apostles to the Slavs.” Called by the Holy Spirit and sent by the Church as missionaries to proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the peoples of Eastern Europe, the brothers traveled to what was then called “Great Moravia” which included territories that are today part of Poland, the Czech Republic, Slovakia, Hungary and Serbia. There they had great success in founding churches and training new clergy, preaching to the people, baptizing them and feeding them with the Body and Blood of the Lord. In order to translate the Scriptures - starting with the Gospels and the Psalms - and liturgical texts of the Church into the language of the Slavs, they even devised an alphabet. Although it has passed through some stages of development over the many years, is still used today in many languages.



The spiritual (and even cultural influence) of these brothers on so many of us within the Polish National Catholic Church cannot be overstated. It is as if Jesus saw so many people hungering for Him, and asked Cyril and Methodius to go and feed them on his behalf, and because they willingly and sacrificially did, the Slavic people have been encountering Christ in the proclamation of the Word and in receiving

Him in the Most Holy Eucharist for over 1,150 years! St. Cyril and St. Methodius, pray for us!

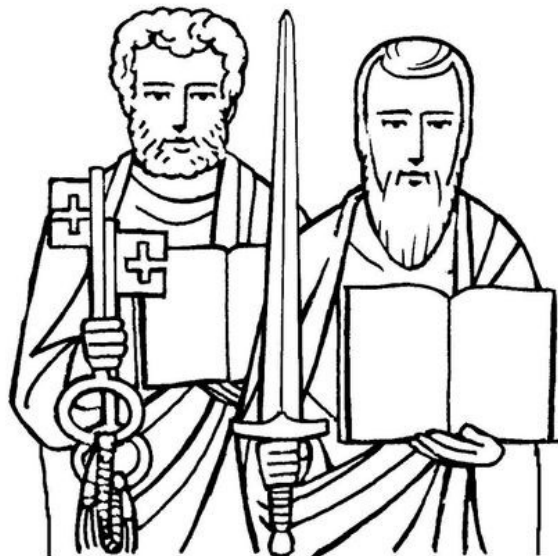
Action Item: Follow the loving and courageous example of "the Apostles to the Slavs" and share your own faith with some else in this simple way: Invite them to come to Mass with you.

Schedule Drive of Collection to help homeless veterans in some way

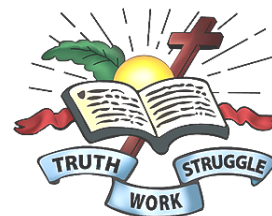
