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Why Ordinary?

I never was a fan of the term "Ordinary Time." Beginning with the first Sunday after the Sunday that falls within the holiday/octave of Corpus Christi, the Church rolls out...Ordinary Time.

As an apologist for the Church, I am fully aware that at times, names kind of fall by the wayside. But I guess that "Ordinary Time" is still better than the previous moniker "the Xth Sunday after Pentecost."

It is the season where the color is green and we get the real meat-and-potatoes of the Christian Faith. Where the entire 40-day Christmas Season tells the story of Jesus' birth and early life and the 50 days of Easter tells the story of the Post-Resurrection world, we are now presented with thematic, connected approach to Jesus' life.

As someone who preaches every Sunday, there is definitely the opportunity to pick a sort-of sub-theme and build off each week's sermon, like telling a long, connected story. For me, this works great, and makes 10000%



sense...for you, the listener, it might be choppy if I reference something I studied for hours the week before and spoke about it for just 2 minutes last Sunday.

We are able to see the benefits of Ordinary Time in those main themes. The Church has written Prefaces (that thing the priest sings before the Sanctus/Holy Holy Holy) that highlight these themes. They are: the Paschal Mystery/People of God, the call to discipleship, the teaching and ministry of Jesus, the miracles of Jesus, and the Eschatological teachings of Jesus.

A couple of them are easy—for a couple Sundays of the year, we may hear when Jesus called Peter and Andrew, James and John from their simple life to the life of an apostle. Miracles are easy too—from healings, water into wine, bringing someone back to life, we can be quite sure when this happens.

The teachings of Jesus end up being tougher to pinpoint...but more fun to preach about. When Jesus heals a blind man, well, we know he sees now! And when Jesus says "And these will go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into eternal life" (Matthew 24:36), well, that just

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gives a preacher ammunition to explain what Jesus means, not just "what happened." These matters of theology that deal with "end times" are filed under *Eschatology*.

Ordinary Time shows its purpose in the details—it is in this season we hear of the dredges of Christ's ministry, the direction he traveled and why, the people he met and the impact on his personality and ministry, and the slow climb to Calvary that began with the words that came out of his mouth.

Where Lent sticks to Lent-y things and Advent sticks to Pre-Jesus things, Ordinary Time is allowed to change focus without warning—from a miracle to a deep teaching back to a miracle, all in a three week span.

I suppose that is what it makes it "ordinary", in that the focus isn't necessarily on an event or holiday/ feast day considered "extraordinary." The crux of this article is that Ordinary Time does take up more than half of the Church Calendar—which means we wear a lot of green! But it also means that we fill in some gaps of our understanding of the faith.

If the Resurrection is our focal point, we have to know what wheels in Jesus' mind had to turn for him to give himself up to death—it is in the events of Ordinary Time that this question is developed, pondered, and answered.

PNCC Future Directions Subcommittee June update

July 1, 2017

Dear Bishops, Very Rev. and Rev. Fathers, Deacons and Faithful of our Holy Church,

As we begin the month of July and are enjoying the summer months of this Year of Commitment, our Holy Church calls to us constant prayer. We thank Fr. Michal Gitner for preparing this month's Future Direction Commitment Message.

It happened that while Jesus was praying in a certain place, after He had finished, one of His disciples said to Him, "Lord, teach us to pray just as John also taught his disciples." (Lk 11:1 NASB).

A strange request by Jesus' disciples, one would assume Jewish men familiar with synagogue religious services. Is that a clue that they were asking for something that nobody taught them before? Were they dissatisfied with just 'saying' their prayers or reciting the Psalms?

Most of us have absorbed the idea of prayer as an action, a behavior, a recitation, a private time in which we think devout thoughts - and almost always with the assumption that this somehow pleases God. Sure it does, since God seems to be easily pleased. But the biblical God is seeking and wanting union with us much more than we are seeking union with God. This is the theme of themes of the whole biblical text, or as Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel says, "God is seeking man."

When Jesus goes into the desert for forty days (Matthew 4:1–11), he does not recite prayers or read the Hebrew Bible (the printing press had not been invented yet!) The Gospels make no mention of Jesus reciting any formula prayers, except at the Last Supper where he and his disciples likely sung the Hallel, or Psalms 113–118 (Matthew 26:30) at the close of the Passover meal.

However, we read about Jesus "leaving the house early" and "going apart to a lonely place to pray" (Mark 1:35). Could it be that it is much easier to live in this state of conscious, loving union with God when there is nothing else competing for our attention?

Hence, if prayer is understood as conscious loving union with God, and with a person in front of me, then we touch the deepest meaning of it. In that sense prayer becomes a way of being in the world, a stance, a way of connecting.

All prayer is practicing for prayer. No one really knows how to pray, as Paul states "We cannot choose words to pray properly, so the Spirit expresses our pleas in a way beyond words—and God knows." (Romans 8:26–27). Without an inner life, our outer prayer will soon become superficial, ego-centered, and even counter-productive on the spiritual path.

Jesus own teaching on prayer is very direct:

*He warns his followers about the very real dangers of public prayer or "standing up in the synagogues" (Matthew 6:5), as he puts it.


*You should go to your private room, shut the door, and pray to your Father who is in that secret place." (Matthew 6:6)

*"In your prayers, do not babble on as the pagans do, thinking that by using many words they will make themselves be heard. Do not be like them!" (Matthew 6:7)

What all of these teachings of Jesus seem to say is that we probably need "unsaying prayer," the prayer of quiet or contemplative prayer, to balance out all "saying prayer."

Jesus never emphasizes posture, timing, or gesture—only intention—which is why we can indeed "pray constantly" (1 Thessalonians 5:16), for it is: **God** is the one who loves and prays through us, **Jesus** shares and participates in this flow with and in his Body (that is us!), and the **Spirit** keeps it all moving, dynamic, alive—and always flowing outward!


