## 40 is a lot of Days!

As this May Newsletter is being printed and sent-out, we've entered the latter half of the Easter Season. In prepping this issue, I was reminded how someone once asked me why the Easter Season goes on for so long.

I started explaining that the 40 week period was reflective of the 40 days of Lent, how 40 is often thought of as a holy number, and a representation of the 40

years of Israelite wandering. I was stopped by the person who said "yeah yeah yeah...but it starts in winter and ends in summer every year."

Tough to argue with! So far, the Easter season in Northeast Ohio has featured days that topped out in the upper 30's as well as days in the 80's. I get it!

In thinking about how long the season seems to be (with the overlapping month of Mary; May), I couldn't help but think of how short these 40 days must have felt to the followers of Jesus Christ. During those days following his crucifixion, they, like all of us who have lost someone at too young of an age, must have re-lived moments of those last 3 years together. The guilt Peter must have had in denying him three times; the pain the apostles felt in having one of their brothers, Judas the Iscariot, responsible for the death of Je-

sus; dealing with the duel-sided feeling of the anger at Judas and sadness at his death; reliving those words of Jesus when he said this would happen. Maybe they just wondered if the other part of that tri-repeated statement would come true; that He would be raised up to life. All these thoughts must have been colored by the pit-in-stomach feeling only the death of a loved one mercilessly provides.



Then He is alive! Scripture shows us He appeared a number of times to His followers across the 4 Gospels. As a kid (with a quick google search as my aid) I remember this incredible 3 week period in 1992—it was the Leonid meteor shower and a total lunar eclipse, both bright and visible in the southern Connecticut sky. I remember what a talking point it was beforehand at school and watching with my younger brother and my best friend from the neighborhood. Every time we saw a meteor, it was magic...and we couldn't wait to see the next one! We were apoplectic when it was time to go inside- we couldn't believe how late it

was! The Crystal Pepsi, Fruitopia, Pizza Hut Doritos, Kudos Bars and other defunct 1990's junk food made the night disappear even faster.

Imagine these events from the perspective of the followers of Jesus! Though scripture shows the appearances of the Glorified Body of the Resurrected Christ, imagine those who weren't there. Imag-

ine those who were there for whom this appearance wasn't enough—they needed to see Him again!

Though scripture notes these appearances...there were more. Flavius Josephus, the great historian of the time, recorded the authenticity of these appearances. He had no horse in the race either—he was born a Jewish elite and defected to the Roman empire—if there was anyone whose life says he should've hid these facts, it was him! But he was committed to recording an honest historical account.

The appearances of Christ indeed appeared over the 40 days following the Resurrection. Our Sunday worship in this Year A of the Liturgical Cycle showed some of them. On the 2nd Sunday of Easter, we heard Jesus' appearance in the upper room and Thomas' doubt and subsequent statement of faith: "My Lord and My God" (John 20:19-31). On the 3rd Sunday of Easter, we heard of the "hearts burning within us" of the disciples on the road to Emmaus (Luke 24:13

-35). On the Solemnity of the Ascension, the 40th Day, we will hear that final appearance before many followers (Matthew 28:16-20).

And then, Easter season still continues for 10 more days, until the Pentecost! Even though upwards of 500 disciples saw Jesus ascend to Heaven...well, why wouldn't they think He would show up again? After all, He died, was buried, and showed up a bunch of times after that! Certainly not making light of that, it simply feeds into how very fast those moments must have been, of hoping (for the first time or one more time) to catch a glimpse of the greatest passing meteor in human history, Jesus Christ.




## Kielbasa Making

## Holy Week At St. Mary's and beyond April 2-8

Holy Week is the second week of Passiontide and the final week of the Lenten Season. As always, it began with our Palm Sunday Liturgy that preceded Holy Mass on Sunday, April 2.

It is a meaningful service, with extra chanting, blessings, procession, and others built in to make it so different than any other Sunday. We are also blessed to have helpers to proclaim the Gospel together, in multiple parts with clergy & laypeople.

Holy Week revs up on Holy Tuesday with the Diocesan Chrism Mass. The clergy of the Western Diocese traveled to the See of the diocese, All Saints Cathedral in Chicago, IL.

We were to take part in not only the Chrism Mass, where the Holy Oils for the year are blessed and consecrated by all priests and our Bishop, the Rt. Rev. Jerry Rafalko, but in the elevation of Minor Orders.

Clerics Doug Scott & David Talaga were elevated to the Minor Order of Sub-Deacon. Sub-Deacon Talaga offered the Readings as part of his Order and Sub-Deacon Scott assisted

Bishop Rafalko at Mass as part of his Order. Congratulations indeed to those young men who are heeding the call of their Lord and Savior to work towards the Diaconate...and perhaps beyond!

The blessed Oils were presented to the parish by Mrs. Susan Boehnlein, parish chair, to begin Maundy Thursday Holy Mass.

At this Mass, we also took on the mandate of Christ to wash the feet of

those present (a half dozen) and recalled the moment of the Institution of the Eucharist. To conclude the liturgy we then processed the Sacrament to the Altar of Repose and ceremoniously stripped the altars.

Good Friday featured three distinct liturgies— at 11am, Fr. Gronn led the Liturgy of the Pre-Sanctified, a service that replicates Holy Mass in some ways but with hosts that were consecrated the night before; at 3pm, Stations of the Cross were walked and prayed upon by those in attendance; and at 7pm, Fr. Soltysiak, Fr. Ploskonka and Bill Zychowski chanted the Tenebrae, with Fr. Gronn leading Chuck Repede & Damion in the assistance. The church also remained open the entire day to allow for per-

sonal mediation before the true presence of Christ in the Most Blessed Sacrament in the morning and early afternoon as well as before the statue of the crucified Christ after the 3pm Service.

Holy Saturday featured Basket Blessing

at Noon and the Holy Saturday Liturgy at 3pm, the most unique church service of the entire year. Holy Water was blessed, the new fire created, the Saints beckoned in Litany, and our promises of Baptism were renewed. The day closed with the final blessing of baskets & set up for Easter Sunday.

## Easter Sunday at St. Mary's

The procession was full! The Symbols of the Resurrection were assembled to their appropriate place; (the Paschal Candle, the Cross of the Eternal Priesthood, and the Statue of the Resurrected Christ). We couldn't stop saying "Alleluia!" We shared a

And we were blessed that the celebration continued! Holy Mass was held at 10am as well, as the celebration from brunch after 1st Mass was receding. #### May: Month of Mary

It is a centuries-old custom of Catholics to dedicate the month of May to the Blessed Virgin Mary. May is always part of the Easter season, the fifty days we celebrate in the liturgy the Resurrection of Our Lord, a time also of awaiting the outpouring of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. May as a Marian month fits well with the liturgical celebrations of Easter and Pentecost as we recall Mary's great joy in her Son's victory over death and her presence with the apostles in the upper room, prayerfully awaiting the descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost day. In our pilgrimage of faith, we always walk with Mary. She is our model of faith and she helps us with her prayers to live by faith. She teaches us to believe as she believed. During this month, Christians, both in church and in the privacy of the home, offer up to Mary from their hearts an especially fervent and loving homage of prayer and adoration. This month, the benefits of God's mercy come down to us from her throne in greater abundance. Many churches and schools celebrate the crowning of Our Lady's figures, and this beautiful custom expresses our love for the Mother of God as our Queen. Through the Litany to the Blessed Virgin Mary, or the Holy Rosary we enter more deeply into the mysteries of Christ's life. All honor that we give to Mary leads to the adoration of God. Devotion to Mary fosters within us a faithful adherence to her Son. When we crown images of Mary, we are honoring her. In honoring Mary, we ultimately praise God for the grace He bestowed on her.

We all probably have our favorite images and our favorite devotions to Blessed Mary: Our Lady of Guadalupe, Our Lady of Fatima, Our Lady of Lourdes, Mother of Perpetual Help, the Miraculous Medal, Blessed Mother of Czestochowa, etc. The many images and devotions express various aspects of Our Lady's vocation and mission. They help us to know the virtues of Mary and remind us to turn to her for her intercession.

I invite you to pray with Mary during this month. Let us commend her for our prayers for life, marriage, children, and families. Let us all place ourselves in Mary's arms to learn how to love God more fervently and love one another as her Son has loved us.

May the Blessed Virgin Mary intercede for us and draw us closer to Christ, her Son!
