What was Jesus' Last Name?

A few weeks ago, my son asked me what Jesus' last name was. Was it Christ?

I gave him an answer that he found satisfactory enough to move on. I thought about it once again at our family Christmas Eve Dinner, which we were blessed to share with my inlaws. Unprompted, Brady announced "If anyone has any questions about Christ, you can ask me now!"

Giving credit to his SOCL teacher, Mrs. Barb Bogzevitz, he fielded a number of questions from each of us, learning a few new things on the way. We enjoyed our meatless dinner (can I still call it "Wigilia" when the main course was penne with vodka sauce?) and, over the next day, a full and wonderful Christmas celebration at church and at home.

On January I & 2, the Church celebrates two specific Solemnities in the life of Christ, but each focus of the solemnity occurs within moments of each other in the life of Jesus: the 1st is the Solemnity of the Circumcision, which follows the traditions and covenant with the Jewish people and God; and the 2nd is the Holy Name of Jesus, where "the name above all names" is elevated.



While I heartily enjoy reflecting on the power of the name of God – the scripture that highlights those moments are quite powerful – I was drawn back to something I read earlier on in Advent – how the name "Jesus", though given by the angel to Mary, was a simple and common name for a Jewish boy at that time. It was as if an angel came to a young girl today and told her that her son would be one for the ages, a Messiah, Son of God, destined for greatness....so, name him Keith.

No offense to any Keiths (a name chosen because no men from this parish are named this!), but it always seemed like an odd match; a common name with a great destiny. Nominative Determinism is the phrase that speaks to how people tend to gravitate towards areas of work that fit their names. The examples of this are fun: Usain Bolt – the fastest man alive: Scott Speed - race car driver; Storm Field - meteorologist; Prince & Cecil Fielder father & son MLB 1st Basemen; and Lieutenant General Sir Manley Power in the 18th century to Lance Corporal Rad Heroman - men whose destiny was always in the military.


Jesus, and others in that time, carried no last name. They would be recognized by their parents (Jesus, son of Mary/Joseph) or geography (Jesus, of Nazareth). Jesus'

name was common, and commonly Romanized as Yeshua, or for our clearest translation today, Joshua. Jesus comes from the transliteration of Yeshua into Greek and then English, as the New Testament was written in Greek first, then translated into other languages.


The Old Testament was written in Hebrew, or perhaps in portions of Aramaic. The longer version of the "Joshua" name appears a few hundred times in the Old Testament, most famously to the conqueror of Jericho. So why do we call the Hebrew hero of Jericho Joshua and the Christian Messiah Jesus?

Greeks did not use the sound sh, so the evangelists substituted an S sound. Then, to make it a masculine name, they added another S sound at the end. The earliest written version of the name Jesus is Romanized today as lesous. (Thus the crucifix inscription INRI: "lesus Nazarenus Rex Iudaeorum," or "Jesus of Nazareth, King

of the Jews.") The J did not even replace the I to begin His holy name until just a few hundred years ago – it became implicit to most readers.

Of course, the name was made holy because of all the underlying titles. Isaiah 9:6 said "And he will be called: Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Father, Prince of Peace". Isaiah 7:14 said "Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign: The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and will call him Immanuel." And this came to fruition in Matthew 1:23, when

the angel said "The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel" (which means "God with us").

When Moses asked what the Israelites should call the Lord, Exodus 3:14 said "God said to Moses, "I AM WHO I AM. This is what you are to say to the Israelites: 'I AM has sent me to you.' " And, in John 18:4-6, we see the full power of everything that makes up the strength of the Holy Name: Jesus, knowing all that was going to happen to him, went out and asked them, "Who is it you want?" "Jesus of Nazareth," they replied. "I AM he," Jesus said. (And Judas the traitor was standing there with them.) When Jesus said, "I AM he," they drew back and fell to the ground."

All of that makes "the name." St. Paul infamously wrote to the Philippians (2:10-11) "that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, of things in heaven, and things in earth, and things under the earth; and that



This message repeats often throughout the Mass for the Holy Name of Jesus. It is why you'll always notice the clergy in the sanctuary bowing at each pronouncement of the Holy Name. Maybe Jesus had no official last name, but his first name certainly carried more than enough weight! *Fr. Jason*

1st Sunday of Advent

The First Sunday of Advent was quite a hopping day at our parish of St. Mary's. Our season kicked off with the blessing of the Advent Wreath by Fr. Jim and the prayers of lighting the first Advent Candle by Fr. Greg. Mass concluded with the clergy offering treats that were predelivered by St. Nicholas, (with help from the Love of God Sodality) honoring his December 6th Feast Day.

Fr. Jason, pastor of St. Mary's, along with Fr. Greg Gronn (retired) and Fr. Jim Ploskonka (reserve) put their minds together during the month of November to set up an Advent Retreat titled "The Shortest Advent Ever".

The event took place after 9am Holy Mass. There were 5 minisessions: "History of Advent" by Fr. Gronn,

"Introduction to the Gospel of Mark" and

"Prophecy of the Baptist" by Fr. Ploskonka, and "Anticipation & Hope: The Themes" and "Advent Traditions Across the World" by Fr. Soltysiak.

The Retreat was designed to be the "shortest Advent Retreat ever", beginning at 10:45am and concluding at noon. The event followed the schedule a little loose-



ly, but concluding sharply on time. Input from parishioners expressed a desire for a similar event by the priests for the upcoming Lenten Season. All the feedback was appreciated as the priests continue to find ways to minister to God's people.







2nd Sunday of Advent

The Second Sunday of Advent featured the prayers of the lighting of the 2nd Advent Candle and the introduction to John the Baptist during 9am Holy Mass as well as a blessing of the oplatek. After Mass, parishioners responded to the call to exercise their democratic right in the Polish National Catholic Church to elect leadership.

Parish Chair Susan Boehnlein called the meeting to order and shortly after, turned the election of officers portion to Fr. Jason. Those serving as parish executives were re-elected without opposition. Many desired to serve as director, and an election spelled out the twelve who were chosen to serve the parish in 2024. Auditors, a Tribunal Member, and Seniorate Representatives were elected as well.
