## I'll Have a Side of...

For many people, the church they currently worship in may very well be the same church the family grew up in; where he or she was baptized, where the near entirety of life's corporal worship of God has taken place.

If this happens to be your particular case at St. Mary's, this is wonderful! This article will make sense...but in my two parish assignments and in the few parishes I grew up in, this lines up with those churches as well.

Side altars, within the sanctuary, are what I would like to pose a few thoughts about. The majority, but not the entirety, of parishes in the Polish National Catholic Church feature these. Here at St. Mary's, our side altars are of Mary (on the Gospel side) and Joseph (on the lesson side), but that is not always the case.

In my travels at the end of 2025, I was brought to my parish as a teenager, St. Joseph's in Westfield, where the side altars are that of Mary (Lesson side) and that of

Christ (Gospel side). The main altar features the parish patron St. Joseph, who is holding a toddler-aged Christ. And my previous parish assignment of St. Stanislaus Cathedral in Scranton, PA had a side altar of Mary (Gospel Side) and of the Ascension (Lesson Side). The main altar reredos actually featured a statue of our Risen Lord, but a ceramic staging of the crucifixion could be raised during Lent as well as a mural of Saint Stanislaus, Bishop and Martyr.

With that note, it was long a custom to have a statue of the parish patron in the middle of the main altar, with a smaller crucifix somewhere within the "reredos", or the ornamented wall/altar/furniture/shelf combination thing that often lines the back of the sanctuary. Newer construction in the middle and late 20th century leaned towards placing a large crucifix in the middle of the area behind the Main Altar in lieu of an ornamented rere-



dos. St. Mary's here is an example of that, having been built in the 1950's as rules for church architecture became a little less rigid.

The side altars are an homage to Catholic History, where the full purpose of any altar, which is to offer sacrifice, would take place. They are recorded to have appeared in churches as early as the 6th century, and even have a rank—the one of the gospel side had a greater "rank" than that of the lesson/epistle side.



Depending on the locale, rules existed historically for only one Mass said on an altar per day, so if a parish had more than one altar, a second priest could do so from there. A visit to many older Catholic Churches will



reveal a number of not only side altars, but side chapels as well. I've visited a number of American Cathedrals that featured a number of side chapels: from 7 in Minneapolis to 6 in New York City to 4 in St. Louis.

An altar of Mary could be used for the celebration of Holy Mass on one of her Feast Days— and the same could be said if the side altar were devoted to John the Baptist or Joseph, two of the most common “other” side altar statues.

Masses were able to be concelebrated on the side altars. As we are used to seeing celebrants crowd around the main celebrant at the Sacrificial Altar, tradition has this taking place on the side altars. But...it would be more accurate to say that three Masses were celebrated at once, rather than a co-celebration. Each celebrant would be saying all of the words of Holy Mass, with one of the goals to all offer the consecration and elevation of the gifts at the same time—a challenge for a fast-talker like me compared to perhaps



someone for whom English is a second or third language.

While the side altars always surround the main worship space and the altar of Sacrifice, recent church architecture has removed the tabernacle from the center of the church and placed it off to the side, with the theology of the celebrant “not having his back to the Presence of Christ during Mass.”

For this reason, our Cathedral in Lancaster, NY (Buffalo area) places the *Catedra*, or the Diocesan Seat of the Bishop behind the Altar of Sacrifice and the Tabernacle and Eucharistic Altar of Repose off to the (Gospel) side of the Altar. Many other parishes that have been built or renovated in the Western Rite have adapted this set up. Some have even gone as far as to build additions to a church to have a Eucharistic Chapel for permanent reposition.

Side altars live on in Polish National practice because of our ethnic history, the historical point of our organization (late 19th Century), and our not being affected by the ultra-aggressive liturgical and

architectural reform of the Roman Catholic Second Vatican Council. There has been an ongoing battle in the RC Diocese of Charlotte, NC between the bishop and his people and priests over a desire to keep altar rails, something we are familiar with at St.

Mary's. In a pious practice, parishes were installing them recently and this edict was only to affect those, not ones that stood historically. However, many of our people who have come from the Roman Catholic practice may recall when permanent altar rails were removed at his or her local church in the past.

Side altars remain because simply, they can. Each should be alit for proper feast days (those of Mary on Mary's altar, those of Joseph for Joseph's) as well as on great Solemnities or when the Bishop is in to celebrate Mass.

We use the altar of Mary for reposition during Holy Week as well as for the temporary transfer of the Blessed Sacrament in our celebration of Marian Devotions during the month of May. Joseph's altar is used as we ask his guardianship over the Nativity display as well as the Advent Wreath.

May our desire to better understand our church (because our eyes are allowed to wander during worship!) serve to heighten our faith.

### Christmastide at St. Mary's



**Father Senior Joseph Henry Soltysiak** went

Born September 14, 1958

in Manchester, NH, he was the son of Henry and Emily (Tomaszewski) Soltysiak. He grew up in the shadow of his grandfather, Bishop Joseph Soltysiak, Bishop of the Eastern Diocese of the Polish National Catholic Church (PNCC). At an early age, his call to serve the Lord at the altar was formed, and after graduation from Manchester West High School in 1976, he moved to Scranton, PA to study at Savonarola Theological Seminary, where he was ordained to the Holy Priesthood on May 2, 1979.

He was proud to serve in the National Catholic Church as priest, serving at various parishes across the PNCC, including Assistant Pastor at St. Stanislaus Cathedral in Scranton, PA; as well as in the role of Pastor at Holy Name of Jesus in South Deerfield, MA; Holy Saviour in Union City, CT, and St. Joseph's in Westfield, MA. Upon assuming the pastorate of St. Joseph's in 1994, that same year he was raised to the dignity of Senior Priest, administering the Eastern Diocese Central Seniorate since that time.

Well before he was "Father", he was Joe, who was always a sports enthusiast. He played high school and semi-pro baseball, and as a senior in high school, earned All-New England honors in the javelin throw. Like many in the area, he was an avid fan of the Red Sox, Patriots, Bruins, and Celtics, in that order. A perfect day ended with one of those teams on his tv, and anyone who visited the rectory was aware of "the shrine" to these teams.

His service to the community was of such importance, as in his various stops, he was a devoted member of the Kiwanis, chaplain to the Westfield Fire Department, the Westfield Clergy Association, and more. He was especially proud to be involved with "Our Community Table", the Westfield Soup Kitchen, where he would often cook Polish delicacies, making sure that St. Joseph's provided "the best meal of the month."

He is missed by his wife of 44 years, Janice (Beggin), formerly of Olyphant, PA; sons Rev. Jason H. Soltysiak (Natalie) of North Royalton, OH, Andrew M. Soltysiak of Westfield, MA, and Nicholas J. Soltysiak of Westfield, MA; brother Stefan of Forestville, CA; grandsons Aiden, Brady, and Jonah, as well as many others who knew and loved him as "Papa".

Fr. Sr. Joe was predeceased by his parents Henry and Emily Soltysiak as well as son Anthony in 2020.

Father Senior Joseph lied in state from 9am -10am at St. Joseph's PNCC Monday, December 29th. Funeral Mass was celebrated by his son, Rev. Jason Soltysiak, at 10am. He was laid to rest at Holy Trinity Cathedral Cemetery in Manchester, NH.




