Usually, we have different parish youth light it each Sunday, but,






with limited attendance due to the pandemic, that wasn't the case this year. Our clergy and acolytes did the job well.



Dear Pastor/Organist,

This past year has been a challenge for every American. Many of our Parishes were closed for a while and attendance at Mass has been reduced due to the effects of the Covid-19 pandemic. Slowly our churches have been working to get back to the routines of Parish life prior to the health crisis. We are all hopeful for the return of our church programs. Our music ministry is no exception.

The last Sunday of January has been set aside by Synodal resolution as Music Scholarship Sunday, which puts special emphasis on the Music Scholarship program of the National United Choirs of the Polish National Catholic Church. It is the Sunday when the choirs, organists, directors and choir members should be recognized for their contributions to the music ministry of our church. It is also the Sunday when we look to the future and identify those that we hope will be part of the music ministry of the PNCC. Music provides inspiration and pleasure to both the musician and the listener. We encourage you to recognize your aspiring musicians in some manner on this Scholarship Sunday.

The Music Scholarship program has a number of endowments and awards that are available to members of the PNCC, whether it is via instrument or voice, regardless of age. It is our calling to encourage and reach those individuals who have the potential and love of music. With encouragement and praise, the rewards are many for all of the PNCC.

The Scholarship Program has a web site, <u>www.nucmusicscholarship.weebly.com</u> where any interested person can learn about the program – its history, awards, and latest winners. Downloads for the next application process are also available on this site. As requested we have also included donation forms, which could be used for individual contributions throughout the year as well as for memorial gifts.

Past financial support from the faithful of the PNCC has enabled us to grant awards annually to deserving applicants. We offer our sincere "thanks" for what has been donated to the Music Scholarship Fund. Since 1966 the Scholarship Program has awarded 1112 members of the PNCC a financial incentive to continue pursuing their musical studies. To date we have awarded \$332,985! It is a rewarding feeling to know that several of the original music scholarship recipients are still active in the music ministry of the PNCC – five decades later! Indeed the program has succeeded!

We hope you will acknowledge Music Scholarship Sunday in your parish and encourage applicants for the program. It is imperative that any collected funds be submitted to your Diocesan Treasurer without delay so your donations can be included in the amounts for the 2021 scholarships. Deacon Jim's End of Year Message—Given on St. Stephen's Day

A Call to Martyrdom December 26, 2020

Acts 6:8-10,7:54-59


The martyrdom of Stephen

Stephen was filled with grace and power and began to work miracles and great signs among the people. But then certain people came forward to debate with Stephen, some from Cyrene and Alexandria who were members of the synagogue called the Synagogue of Freedmen, and others from Cilicia and Asia. They found they could not get the better of him because of his wisdom, and because it was the Spirit that prompted what he said. They were infuriated when they heard this, and ground their teeth at him.

But Stephen, filled with the Holy Spirit, gazed into heaven and saw the glory of God, and Jesus standing at God's right hand. 'I can see heaven thrown open' he said 'and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God.' At this, all the members of the council shouted out and stopped their ears with their hands; then they all rushed at him, sent him out of the city and stoned him. The witnesses put down their clothes at the feet of a young man called Saul. As they were stoning him, Stephen said in invocation, 'Lord Jesus, receive my spirit.'

Deacon's Thoughts and Reflection:

In the early Church, martyrdom is a thoughtprovoking and fascinating topic to study, for numerous were the number of martyrs and too, in time its symbolism. A martyr is defined by the Word of God as, One who bears witness of the truth, and suffers death in the cause of Christ (Acts 22:20; Revelation 2:13; 17:6). There is a wide interlude in the reading taken from the Apostles' Acts, between Deacon Stephen's apprehension and his stoning – an authorized execution (?). Deacon Stephen's discourse is retrospectively not surprising that it led to his death, for it demonstrated with ample biblical references that throughout history the children of Israel had opposed God's blessings. It was consistent with their actions that they would challenge the Holy Spirit by rejecting Jesus.



St. Stephen's message was imperative in the development of the Book of Acts and another opportunity offered to Jerusalem, which is a mirroring of the Old Testament in the number of times Moses was disregarded by the Children of Israel. "The time has now come for the Good News to spread to Judaea and Samaria and the ends of the earth."

I can't imagine the emotions that might have been going through St. Stephen's mind, how each stone wounded his body – yet, he felt no pain, how the noise of the crowd –was inaudible to him and how the faces were in plain sight– yet, he could only see Jesus! This power and faith of St. Stephen is an amazing example of service and sacrifice. Service and sacrifice, something those that have been called to serve God and spread the Good News, make a lifelong commitment to do, deacons included.

I have been asked over the past year, "how is it being a deacon?" My intent in answering that question is to share what Jesus Christ has been doing through me this year, and to share some of the amazing things that are happening in the work of the Church.

Deacon Jim's End of Year Message—Given on St. Stephen's Day

So, with that stated, the short answer to what is it like being a deacon... it is amazing! But amazing does not take into account the "why" behind the "what". So, let me expound why it has been amazing.

First and foremost the journey to my ordination began decades before and like the Season of Advent brings a sense of longing, this was something I longed to do for a very large part of my life. My first memory of wanting to become a priest was a dialogue between myself at the age of eight and Prime Bishop Thaddeus Zielinski. The account would be retold by my mother that I indicated I wanted to be a bishop (!), but Prime Bishop Zielinski indicated that I would have to become a priest first.

About that same age my Uncle Joe Szalkta, who built the original barracks at Spojnia Farm in 1933, gave me \$1,000.00 to put into an account to pay for seminary studies. At my childhood home in Pennsylvania, I used to practice serving at the altar on the top of my mother's piano, having Mass and intoning Święty, Święty, Święty (Holy, holy, holy) for Adoration of the Most Blessed Sacrament ...but these are stories for another time.

Fast forward 50 years...I have been afforded amazing blessings over the past year as deacon.

Don't get me wrong – being blessed wasn't without a few trials, challenges, disappointments and opportunities to learn. Structurally I was pleased to assist our Bishop in serving as Chair of our Diocesan Synod. In the middle of a pandemic with an ever changing direction on combating COVID, we were blessed by being able to reduce participation costs for the constitutionally required synod and as a result able to lift some financial burden to those throughout the diocese. Our parish of St. Mary's saw a savings

of \$1,500.00. Even more of a blessing was the amazing presence of the Holy Spirit from Bishop Jerry's opening message and throughout all the proceedings.


At the start of the pandemic and the unfortunate need to suspend in-person worshipping, I was blessed being able to share information about the history and hymns of our church. I felt the love by all the positive notes and feedback. I was blessed being able to assist the amazing work Father Jason did in setting up Holy Masses and liturgies to bring the Gospel to so many. It was also a blessing being a part of our Polish Fest Drive-Thru dinner. Was it not amazing that we sold out of food on day 1 – lines upon lines to get to St. Mary's – awesome!

While I see the hand of God in all that has taken place, my amazement comes on a weekly basis as I am blessed to visit with each person who comes to our food ministry, about 275 per month. I know beyond a shadow of a doubt that His hand is holding mine in His ministry of taking care of those in need while I ask the questions: how are you doing? How was your past week? And how does your upcoming week look? These simple questions turn into a time of payer, sharing of one's heart and a realization that God is working through me – this takes my breath away.

The time has now come for the Good News to spread! The miracles, prayers, songs and fellowship with Christ are amazing. The ministry of a deacon is awesome and I thank Christ Jesus for His gifts and blessings. May I humbly continue in His and your service.
