Calendars are interesting, aren't they?

Though that rhetorical question got some proverbial crickets chirping, I felt like calendars could be addressed in this newsletter due to a few things that happen in the church calendar as well as being fueled by some inspiration from what our Prime Bishop Anthony Mikovsky wrote in the February 2024 issue of God's Field/Rola Boza.

In the opening paragraph of his article, he reminded us Polish National Catholics that: "Because of the calendar calculations this year, the celebration of Easter is rather quite early, March 31, 2024. In fact, it is somewhat rare that Easter occurs in March, but it is bound up with the coming of Spring and the phases of the moon. Easter occurs on the Sunday following the full moon following the Spring equinox, which is March 21. Therefore, Easter can be any day from March 22 to April 25."

I will add that for the sake of this article, Ash Wednesday is calculated just by going back 6 Sundays and a Wednesday. It can fall as early as February 4 and as late as March 10.

As Christianity began to spread in the days after Pentecost, it was heavily influenced by the cultures and cities where individual churches were plant-



ed. Christian churches in Rome were very Roman, those in Greece were very Greek, those in and around Jerusalem, were very Jewish. These "inside" influences, as well as those from other outside religions really brought into question how the church was going to function on various levels.

One of them was time...calendars. Most of the world currently uses the Gregorian Calendar, which went into effect in 1582 at the papal bull (or formal declaration) of Pope Gregory XIII. It wasn't rocket science, per se...but it was based on a better understanding of the cosmos than

when the Julian calendar went into effect in 46 BC. Bearing Julius Caesar's name, it likened the calendar to exactly 365.25 days long: 3 years and a leap year. Science showed the math was a bit off, and on March 1st of this year in "our" Gregorian Calendar...it is still February 17th on the Julian Calendar, 13 days lagging...and falling behind farther with each passing year. Just take a peek at the picture below of the October 1582 calendar— 11 days were lopped-off at that papal bull to make things "right".

Where the church has had a major impact on the world in "timekeeping", they had decisions to make early on. The Jewish calculation of time in the time of Christ and the Apostles (and still today) runs from sundown-to-sundown — I full day. The Sabbath begins at sundown Friday, and concludes at sundown Saturday. With Christianity emanating from Jerusalem, this means the Christian sabbath was from sundown Saturday to Sundown Sunday — all is good!

But then...the church grew beyond Jerusalem. The Greeks tracked days

from sun-up to sun-up...Sunrise on Sunday to Sunrise on Monday. And then, the Romans calculated time like we do secularly: midnight to midnight. For a period of time, this created much confusion, especially to traveling Christians. Theoretically, one could begin our Lord's day in Jerusalem on a Saturday evening and end it in Greece early Monday morning!

Ultimately, while the Church theoretically follows the original Jewish religious "keeping of hours" (think, if a parish has a

vigil Mass on a Saturday late afternoon/evening before the Sunday celebration, traditional Sunday vespers to end the Lord's day), it still follows that Roman idea of midnight -to-midnight at times- or else, Midnight Mass would never have had any shine!


Since calendars can be fickle, as Prime Bishop referenced above, the PNCC has a liturgical landmine in the middle of the Lenten Season – the Solemnity of the Institution of the PNCC, each year on the 2nd Sunday of March. During the celebration of this Mass, Lent takes a pause for this great solemnity of our Polish National Catholic Faith.

Unless it doesn't! While this Solemnity normally supersedes whichever Sunday of Lent it falls upon, there are two exceptions...and we are smack in the middle between these exceptions occurring! In 2019, Lent began quite late, which meant that the First Sunday of Lent fell on March 10th...the 2nd Sunday of Lent, usually the above Solemnity. However, the Gospel of the Temptation of our Lord paints such an incredible picture to begin the Lenten season that it cannot ever be missed! And, in 2027, an exceptionally early start to Lent means that the 2nd Sunday of March, usually Solemnity, is Passion Sunday, or the 5th Sunday of Lent. The PNCC has kept the 2-week season of Passiontide as a solemn one, and the 5th Lenten Sunday can't be bumped for the PNCC Solemnity. When this "bumping" takes place (the official term is "translated), the Mass for the Institution of the PNCC is then celebrated that Monday morning.

With all of that calendar knowledge in your back pocket now, may our days of Lent be kept holy in our traditional increased prayer (use an app!) fasting (use an app!) and almsgiving (don't use an app!). Fr. Jason

Parishioners and friends dined on blooming onions, steaks, salads, and about a million warm rolls with cinnamon butter. Thank you to all who supported this venture!




Ash Wednesday & Lenten Devotions

Recap of the January and February Parish Committee Meeting Minutes

Our newly elected Committee Members (Carole D'Arcy and Stella Pietka) were welcomed. Father Jason Soltysiak thanked everyone who stayed after mass for the Advent retreat. A short Lenten retreat is being planned. Fr. Jason visited six homes for Epiphany blessings. He would love to increase that number in 2025.

Fundraisers:

Our next dine-out fundraiser is Texas Roadhouse planned for early February

Holy Hotcakes dinner and paczki sale is again planned for Fat Tuesday

Dine-in or Carry-out Fried Pierogi Dinner will take place Friday, February 23rd – The Mission and Love of God Sodality groups are hosting this fundraiser

Kolaczki will be sold for Easter

Fr. Jason led the Annual Fundraiser meeting on February 8th, lots of ideas were discussed and will be researched. During the February Committee meeting it was decided to have a weekly 50/50 raffle with winning tickets drawn during coffee hour (the winner must be present to win).

Buildings & Grounds

The basement boiler vent was leaking and replaced, the expansion tank was full of water and drained. Everything is working.

The rectory's awning was loosened during a storm, new anchors were attached

Concern about the outside lights not being on was addressed. It was explained that the church often experiences brief power outages. The outages affect the timer for the lights as well as the church chimes.

The stair lifts have been repaired

Walk-in freezer handle needs attention, Steve Fesz "fixed" it during the meeting. It was just "frozen" from condensation from the door being left open too long.

New LED bulbs were installed in the fixtures in the nave (main area) of the church by Tom and Cherie Kugler

All the church fire extinguisher are out of date and need to be replaced.

The basement kitchen stove hood was re-certified and must be recertified every six months.

As required by the PNCC Constitution a proposed budget for 2024 was distributed and discussed. Approximately 5% has been added to the 2023 figures while the budgeted amounts for utilities and fundraisers was increased 10%. The Committee approved the budget to present to the parishioners at the Annual Meeting where it was also approved.

Property insurance – increasing 55%. Bids from other carriers have been requested. The church and property have an estimated value between \$2.6 and \$3.9 million.

St. Mary's is hosting the United Choirs meeting in April and the Bowling Tournament in May.

YMS of R and helpers sorted clothing donations. The donations were donated to and picked-up by <u>Rise in Love</u>. This is a charitable Christian-based organization operating in northeast Ohio.

The March Committee meeting is March 18th at 5pm – all are welcome.
