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Candlemania!

It wasn't that long ago when I made my first trip to St. Mary's in the summer of 2013 with my wife Natalie. Bishop Bilinski had invited us out to sort of get a glimpse of the parish, just in case things broke out in one way or another.

We stayed in downtown Cleveland because it was nice out and thought it'd be fun to walk around— it was. It also happened to be the night of the NBA Draft when the Cleveland Cavaliers had the first pick and chose...Anthony Bennet. Don't remember him? Neither does anyone else. I do recall walking outside of a bar and hearing an audible gasp of disappointment from the faithful watching on TV.

Though that was a vivid memory of our first trip Cleveland...there was another. I remember coming up the back stairs (from the basement) to enter into the church. I scoped out the pillars, pews, altar...and wait a second...why were there two eternal lights set up in the Sanctuary?



It was something I had never seen (but I have seen evidence of this elsewhere). Bishop explained that, simply, you can always keep an eye on the candle and light the one on the opposite side to keep it "eternal."

This is also the first parish I am at where an actual candle, not a light bulb, stands as the Eternal Lamp/Sanctuary Lamp/Wieczny Lampa/Tabernacle Lamp/Chancel Lamp/Everlasting Flame/...I'll call it "Eternal Light" throughout. Which means, it is something I have to think about every 8-10 days now.

Sometimes, I admit that it annoys me when that dang lamp is going out again. That looks pretty bad on paper, doesn't it? But I relent always, and do the job with the reverence that is needed. And it is needed—let's have a look at the history behind this omnipresent fixture at (almost) all houses of worship.

Exodus 27:20-21 (NRSV) states: "You shall further command the Israelites to bring you pure oil of beaten olives for the light, so that a lamp may be set up to burn regularly. In the tent of meeting, outside the curtain that is before the covenant, Aaron and his sons shall tend it from evening to

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morning before the Lord. It shall be a perpetual ordinance to be observed throughout their generations by the Israelites.

"Ner Tamid" is the "Eternal Light" that burns in Jewish Synagogues to-day. Per the Encyclopedia Britannica: "It reminds the congregation of the holiness of the Torah scrolls that are stored within the ark and calls to mind God's abiding presence and his providential care of the Jewish people. The Ner Tamid also represents the light that burned continuously in the western section of the ancient Temple of Jerusalem.

As we are a faith evolved from Judaism, we have taken this tradition and have used it to mark our holiest of holies in the church itself: Jesus Christ, present in the Tabernacle in the Consecrated Body.

The lamps have evolved: churches were required to use burning olive oil up until the 2nd Vatican Council. Though we are not Roman Catholic, we often follow along with some of their rules (especially because they often determine what is sold at religious goods stores).

The lamp may be freestanding, hung over the Altar, or attached to the wall. It should never be far away from the Tabernacle in the Catholic Church. A recent development has been Tabernacles not in the center of the church—the Eternal Light

would then be located nearer the place where Jesus Christ is reserved.

This merits mentioning as we are about halfway through the Lenten Season. The only time of year that this Eternal Light gets "messed with" is during Holy Week, beginning with the Holy Thursday Reposition Liturgy.

If you recall attending Holy Thursday Mass, it concludes awkwardly...a word I love to use during the *Triduum*, or the last 3 days of Holy Week. Mass concludes with a short procession of the Eucharist from the Tabernacle to one of repose, usually in

At this point, the altars would be stripped and the main Eternal Light extinguished, with a new one lighted where the Eucharist, that True Presence of Christ, is now reposed at the side altar.

The symbolism is wonderfully spiritual, and it is done with chaotic sections of Psalms being read while the Sanctuary of the church is turned upside-down.

Dear Bishops, Very Rev. and Rev. Fathers, Deacons and Faithful of our Holy Church,

The theme for our March 2018 Future Direction message is Celebrating Lent as a Family. We are sending this out a week early as we are now in the beginning stages of our Lenten journey. Here is a list of various ideas for you and your family to do together that will make this a more meaningful walk with Christ, an important time of renewal and growing closer to our Lord, His Church and your family.

- 1- Attend the special Lenten Masses, services and retreat at your parish as a family
- 2- Encourage each other in our intensified works of charity, prayer and fasting
- 3- Marking the family's calendar NOW to plan on attending the special liturgies during Holy Week together.
- 4- Volunteer as a family to help those in need in whatever way is needed in your respective community
- 5- Serve at or donate to a soup kitchen or soup pantry as a family.
- 6- A clothing drive 40 days 40 Items as a family
- 7- Practice Kindness daily: no gossip, no complaining, complement others, be supportive
- 8- Donate blood together
- 9- Participate in the 30 hour famine or do one as a family
- 10- Visit someone who is sick, in a nursing home or homebound as a family
- 11- Offer a daily Lenten Meditation or scriptural reading as a family prior to or after the family shared meal
- 12- Pray the Litany of the Passion together as a family on one day of the week. PNCC Prayer book
- 13- Praying the Sorrowful Mysteries of the Rosary as a family
- 14- Replace 30 minutes of screen time (TV/Computer/iPad/Smart Phone) with 30 minutes of prayer/devotion/scripture reading
- 15- Pick a day during Lent to go screen free (no internet/TV)
- 16- If you cannot attend stations of the cross or sorrowful lamentations as a family then as a family pray them from our PNCC prayer book
- 17- Making an almsgiving jar or collection box to collect change and money that goes to help others in some way.
- 18- "Charity Starts at Home Day"--picking a special day in which each member of the family performs acts of loving service for another member
- 19- Sing a Lenten hymn together as a family after a shared meal play one from YouTube
- 20- If you have younger children coloring together Lenten pictures downloaded and printed
- 21- Read the passion together as a family Matthew 26 & 27; Mark 14 & 15; Luke 22 & 23 and John 18 & 19
- 22- Watching a movie about the life of the Lord together and discussing afterward
- 23- Choose a Lenten sacrifice to do as a family i.e. not eating out, not going to a movie, concert or event during Lent.
- 24- Attend a Meal in the Upper Room if one is offered at your parish as a family Share a symbolic Passover Meal as a family Meal in the Upper Room overview Click Here
- 25- As a family prepare an Easter basket to be brought to church to be blessed or an Easter table for the priest to come and bless
