Just Before Easter

Depending on how the weeks line up during Lent sort of depends how my articles line up on a monthly basis. I obviously enjoy writing something each month, be it a musing on something that happened at church/in life, or something with a little more depth. Today's question du jour was, with April 1 still in the teeth of Lent, should I write something about Lent or something about Easter. And after some internal debate, I felt it appropriate to address something that I never really do- the Good Friday Liturgy.

Throughout my life, I have attended or ministered at parishes where the Liturgy of the Pre-Sanctified, the only required thing a priest is to do on Good Friday, has been celebrated at times ranging from early morning (8am), mid morning, and evening.



This Good Friday service is part 2 of the Triduum Liturgy that begins with Holy (Maundy) Thursday's Mass of the Institution of the Holy Eucharist. How Thursday's Liturgy ends is how Friday's begins, with that one peculiarity – the priest plans to consecrate extra hosts to be the Body of Christ to not only be distributed to the people on Good Friday, but for the priest himself to receive at the Good Friday Liturgy.

Hence, it really isn't correct to call the Good Friday service "Mass"- the official title goes "liturgy of the presanctified". The omission of Mass reflects the deep sorrow the Church has in remembering the sacrifice of our Lord on the first Good Friday. The church, simply, is not permitted to have Mass celebrated this day.

Portions of worship "feel" like Mass...and, like anytime in church, when we veer-off a little bit from the norm, it feels like we go way off! The service consists of a solemn procession, readings (including the Passion in the Gospel of St. John), a

series of petitions, the veneration of the cross, receiving the elements, and a Communion service. The simple Communion service includes the recitation of the Our Father, the proclamation "This is the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world, happy are those who are called to His Supper," and then the reception of Holy Communion (which was consecrated at the Holy Thursday Mass of the Lords Supper) by the celebrant and the faithful.

Byzantine churches (like Holy Spirit parish across from the gates of our Sacred Heart of Jesus Cemetery) retain the practice to have many presanctified liturgies throughout the church year, mainly in Lent. Especially reserved for Wednesdays and Fridays during Lent, the Anaphora, or Eucharistic Prayer (as we have listed 1-5 in our Contemporary Rite Liturgy) is omitted. This reflects a softening of the joyfulness that the anaphora

(translated as, "thanksgiving") offers as remind worshippers to focus on other portions of prayer and increased reception of Communion.

I mentioned the phrase "Triduum Liturgy" earlier, which encompasses Maundy Thursday's events, Good Friday's Pre-Sanctified Liturgy, and the "odd" worship service that takes place on Holy Saturday. Traditionally, this third part (Holy Saturday) would take place late evening, culminating with an overnight (into the next day) Resurrection Mass, marking the Day of Resurrection. This is

the same idea of having Mass at Midnight on Christmas – let us celebrate, ASAP!

If one were to attend each portion of the Triduum, it would make more sense why the Easter Procession always begins from the Altar of Repose (Mary's Altar at our parish). For the previous 3 days, that area where procession kicks-off has represented the site of Jesus' arrest, his trial, his crucifixion, his placement in the tomb and subsequent entombing. The Mass of Resurrection begins by cele-

brating His final victory over all the "negative" that has taken place on that site the last few days — with the priest joyfully proclaiming to the congregation and to the world: "Come Rejoice the Lord is Risen/Wesoly nam dzis dzien nastal!" Fr. Jason

Various Announcements

PASSIONTIDE – Passiontide is the last two weeks before Easter. It commemorates the solemn turn the church takes in the Lenten Season as Christ prepares for the Passion. You'll notice the crucifixes in church are covered, that the organ is muted at times, and that "Lord for us, your wounds were suffered" replaces "Glory be to the Father...

COLLECTION FOR UKRAINE — The Prime Bishop of the PNCC, the Most Rev. Anthony Mikovsky, has advised parishes to have a collection that will support our sister parishes in the PNKK, our sister denomination in Poland. They are ministering directly to Ukrainian refugees. Our parish committee made the decision to have a weeks-long collection, with envelopes available today and through Palm Sunday, April 10, with donations sent that week in time for Easter. Please be supportive of this peaceful endeavor.

CHURCH PROPERTY CLEAN-UP — We will hold another clean-up day on Saturday, April 23, beginning at 10am. Anyone can come and lend a hand, and especially helpful would be if you brought your own rakes, shovels, brooms, hedge trimmers, and gardening gloves. Lunch & snacks will be provided with a rain date in May.

<u>LENTEN FOOD COLLECTION</u> – Has concluded. We partnered with the Polish

National Union of America spring program: People Need Us- Roll away the Stone of Hunger, sponsored by PNU District 5 & 12 and hosted by Branch 112.

ONLINE WORD OF GOD STUDY – The Lenten online study led by Fr. Sr. John Kowalczyk has concluded. In a few weeks, Deacon Jim & Father Jason will lead one in early May on the Acts of the Apostles. We hope you will consider being a part of it.

PAPER BIN RECYCLING – The collection bin has arrived in the parking lot of our parish It is for you to drop off your paper, cardboard, and bagged paper shredding. This collection box was voted upon by the parish committee and the parish receives a portion of money each quarter, based on how much is recycled.

LENTEN CROSS – The Mission Team is again sponsoring the Lenten Prayer Cross. It was raised on Ash Wednesday and placed in the back, parking lot side corner of the church (Mary's corner – her statue and window reside there!). Please take on that Lenten discipline of increased prayer and devotion and plan on placing your prayers upon it.

<u>READING OF THE PASSION</u> – On Palm Sunday, we hear the Passion Account from St. Luke's Gospel. This gospel sets up Holy Week, and leaves no room for a homily.

<u>POLISH FOOD</u> – You can place your Easter Kolaczki order with the forms near the parish mailboxes, by speaking to Patti D. or Susan B. Pierogi is sold out!!! Pick up for kolaczki is Holy Saturday while a pickup for the others is this Saturday from 2-4pm.

<u>PARISH LIBRARY</u> – Please be on the lookout in the coming weeks for a small parish lending library- a bookcase will be set up with religious and cultural books to borrow – see Fr. Jason with any questions.

The services were well-attended and provided the first step needed for all of us to "take on the Lord Jesus Christ." Lenten Devotions began that Friday, March 5, beginning with Stations of the Cross. We walked the first set of Stations and concluded with the Benediction and Exposition of the Most Blessed Sacrament. Services were held each Friday during March.

Preceding our Lenten Season was the return of our Holy Hotcake Dinner and paczki sale. As our chairperson Susan notes later in this newsletter, thank you to all who worked and ate!

The Parish took a quick break during the Lenten Season to celebrate the PNCC Solemnity of the Institution of the PNCC, with 2022 marking

Easter Lamb Cake – a traditional Eastern European Dessert representing Christ as the sacrificial Lamb of God.



For the last 25-30 years I've been baking the Lamb Cake. The cake doesn't always get eaten as there are so many other things to eat. The years I don't have time to bake the cake or the cake simply doesn't cooperate are always the year when someone asks

"Where's the Lamb cake?" Last year the cake stuck to the mold, it was really bad. Thankfully, I have a great husband who shakes his head, cleans the mold, seasons it (again) for next year's attempt.

Let us take some time to reflection on the amazing example our Lord gave us at the Last Supper by serving our Lord and showing our love for Him in the way we serve others

Scripture: John 13:1-15

Reflection & Action Items – On Holy or Maundy Thursday we hear about the Last Supper, the Passover Meal our Lord celebrated with His disciples from John's Gospel. What is important for us to realize in this most important passage of Holy Scripture is how Jesus yokes receiving His Presence in the Eucharist to a life of serving others. In God's Word we hear how during this most sacred meal during which the Holy Eucharist was instituted our Lord taught them to wash the feet of others. To serve and wash others feet is tied directly to receiving the Body and Blood of our Lord. Receiving Holy Com-



munion should compel us to action as servants and disciples of our Lord – living as He commanded. "You call me Teacher and Lord—and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you."

Reflection & Action Item: Strengthened by receiving the Holy Eucharist, allow Christ to live in you by your works of love and mercy to others, especially those in need. During this month offer three

works of mercy or deeds of kindness for others in the Name of our Lord Jesus Christ.


