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A Lord for All!

"Caravans of camels shall fill you, dromedaries from Midian and Ephah; all from Sheba shall come bearing gold and frankincense, and proclaiming the praises of the LORD." (Isaiah 60:6)

This is written at the conclusion of the 12th Day of Christmas, the Solemnity of the Epiphany. Epiphany, defined by the church, means "A sign of Divine power/the manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles in the form of the Magi." According to Webster's Dictionary, it is "a moment of sudden revelation or insight."

The New Year of the Church/
Beginning of a new Liturgical Cycle is always the 1st Sunday of Advent. As was the case this year, I noted in a bulletin announcement how we now predominantly hear from St.
Matthew's Gospel, with some sprinkles of John and the others. And since we entered the Advent Season on



December 1, I've tried to stress the fulfillment of Old Testament prophecy each step of the way in God's Incarnation in the form of Jesus Christ.

Some of the meat of that prophecy comes from the Responsorial Psalm from Psalm 72 that is used not only on the Feast Day, but during the "Octave" as well. In the church, an Octave is "the liturgical celebration of a feast for eight days- on the day itself and the seven following days." This has Old Testament roots as well, and to date, only the Octaves of Christmas, Epiphany, Easter, Pentecost, and Corpus Christi are still celebrated in the Polish National Catholic Church.

The Responsorial Psalm below is from the Feast Day of Epiphany, Psalm 72:1-2,7-8,10-11,12-13: some of the following days within the Octave add more verses from Psalm 72

R. (cf. 11) Lord, every nation on earth will adore you.

(1-2) O God, with your judgment endow the king, and with your justice, the king's son;

He shall govern your people with justice and your afflicted ones with judgment.

R. Lord, every nation on earth will adore you.

(7-8) Justice shall flower in his days, and profound peace, till the moon be no

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more. May he rule from sea to sea, and from the River to the ends of the earth.

R. Lord, every nation on earth will adore you.

(10-11)The kings of Tarshish and the Isles shall offer gifts; the kings of Arabia and Seba shall bring tribute. All kings shall pay him homage, all nations shall serve him.

R. Lord, every nation on earth will adore you.

(12-13)For he shall rescue the poor when he cries out, and the afflicted when he has no one to help him. He shall have pity for the lowly and the poor;

the lives of the poor he shall save.

R. Lord, every nation on earth will adore you.

Reading through this Psalm, we see how powerful the Epiphany is. The Lord, the Almighty, at the point of this writing, was almost solely the mono-theistic property of the Jewish People. They were His chosen people, He was their God. But, in this piece of scripture, we see how God was meant to be *more*. How, though chosen, the Jewish people knew better than to put limits on God. They were painfully aware of His mercy, with their (and later, our) history littered with bouts of straying-from and returning-to Him.

Every nation on earth will adore you! And not because they will be forced to – it will be as natural as a

group of men who study the sky, noticing something new...and remembering that, once upon a time, they heard something of some religion that this would mean something big. The first part of the Epiphany, that sign of Divine Power, was that these mean, clearly Gentile (non-Jewish), clearly from the East, clearly of a different background of anyone else in the area, just knew that this star was something that

they were supposed to pursue. Their knowledge of the skies and foreign texts clearly shows how God chose them as instruments of faith. Verse 10-11 pretty much gives everything away! The extent of where those wise men/magi/kings would come from, repeating that listed place from the opening scripture from Isaiah. The homage that would be paid, by full-grown, and powerful men.

For us, the Epiphany is beautiful in the history we can see: the Old Testament clues, the historical accounts of the Magi, the development of the celebration in a growing Christian Church. The church offers pastoral visitations to continue to bring Christ into the lives of the faithful, marked by the names of the Magi. May continued insight into the celebration offer a greater appreciation of the God we worship. *Fr. Jason*




A Note from the Chair

As I searched for what I wanted to share with you this month I found a story that truly tells all......

A BABY'S HUG

We were the only family with a child in the restaurant. I sat Erik in a high chair and noticed everyone was quietly sitting and talking.

Suddenly, Erik squealed with glee and said, "Hi." He pounded his fat baby hands on the high chair tray. His eyes were crinkled in laughter and his mouth was bared in a toothless grin, as he wriggled and giggled with merriment. I looked around and saw the source of his merriment. It was a man whose pants were baggy with a zipper at half-mast and his toes poked out of would-be shoes. His shirt was dirty and his hair was uncombed and unwashed. His whiskers were too short to be called a beard and his nose was so varicose it looked like a road map. We were too far from him to smell, but I was sure he smelled. His hands waved and flapped on loose wrists. "Hi there, baby; Hi there, big boy. I see a, buster," the man said to Erik.

My husband and I exchanged looks, "What do we do?" Erik continued to laugh and answer, "Hi." Everyone in the restaurant noticed and looked at us and then at the man. The old geezer was creating a nuisance with my beautiful baby.

Our meal came and the man began shouting from across the room, "Do ya patty cake? Do you know peek-a-boo? Hey, look, he knows peek-a-boo."

Nobody thought the old man was cute. He was obviously drunk. My husband and I were embarrassed. We ate in silence; all except for Erik, who was running through his repertoire for the admiring skid row bum, who in turn, reciprocated with his cute comments.

We finally got through the meal and headed for the door. My husband went to pay the check and told me to meet him in the parking lot. The old man sat poised between me and the door. "Lord, just let me out of here before he speaks to me or Erik," I prayed. As I drew closer to the man, I turned my back trying to sidestep

him and avoid any air he might be breathing. As I did, Erik leaned over my arm, reaching with both arms in a baby's "pick-me-up" position. Before I could stop him, Erik had propelled himself from my arms to the man's. Suddenly a very old smelly man and a very young baby consummated their love and kinship. Erik in an act of total trust, love, and submission laid his tiny head upon the man's ragged shoulder. The man's eyes closed, and I saw tears hover beneath his lashes. His aged hands full of grime, pain, and hard labor, cradled my baby's bottom and stroked his back. No two beings have ever loved so deeply for so short a time. I stood awestruck. The old man rocked and cradled Erik in his arms and his eyes opened and set squarely on mine. He said in a firm commanding voice, "You take care of this baby". Somehow I managed, "I will," from a throat that contained a stone. He pried Erik from his chest, lovingly and longingly, as though he were in pain. I received my baby, and the man said, "God

bless you, ma'am, you've given me my Christmas gift." I said nothing more than a muttered thanks.

With Erik in my arms, I ran for the car. My husband was wondering why I was crying and holding Erik so tightly, and why I was saying, "My God, my God, forgive me." I had just witnessed Christ's love shown through the innocence of a tiny child who saw no sin, who made no judgment; a child who saw a soul, and a mother who saw a suit of clothes. I was a Christian who was blind, holding a child who was not. I felt it was God asking, "Are you willing to share your son for a moment?" when He shared His for all eternity. The ragged old man, unwittingly, had reminded me, "To enter the Kingdom of God, we must become as little children."


PARISH ENVELOPES
