### Food Ministry Battle Plan

Holy Mass on the Solemnity of the Epiphany was con-celebrated by Fr. Jason and Fr. Greg, with the assistance of Deacon Jim on Wednesday, January 6. Fr. Jason offered the homily as well, focusing on the fact that the Magi, though not Jewish, recognized Jesus as Savior of all. There was a nice little crowd at church and online, worshiping on this important Solemnity of Our Lord, wit-





nessing the traditional blessing of chalk and incense.

Later in the day, there was a meeting of the Food Ministry Committee, with Deacon Jim giving a well-prepared report and potential plans for the 2021 year. This included a rotating menu, working in extra help and training new volunteers, as well as three very important blessings.

The first was a commitment to serve hot meals on a weekly basis indefinitely. This would be easier with more help, but attainable if no volunteers came forward. The second was the disclosure of a very generous donation made by Nate and Amanda Ploskonka and family- which was to cover costs

of a weekly ministry on a quarterly basis for as long as the ministry remains active.

After mulling over this Food Ministry meeting and plans for a number of days, Fr. Jason was compelled to preach about the selfless nature of this ministry and our need for volunteers. "What are you looking for?" was

the question in John's Gospel that Father extended to the congregation in his homily...further explaining how selfless and humble preparing and serving food is.

Our parish has since been blessed and lifted-up by a number of volunteers who are now part of the schedule or will be once the clocks change.

Oh, that third blessing I mentioned before? The fact that besides being dedicated to preparing and serving food for 8 years now, Deacon Jim, being the statistics guy that he is, has tracked how many individuals meals have been served at each individual Food Ministry date since it's inception! After serving 84 on Wednesday, February 3, that has lead to a total amount of free meals served by our parish since inception at 9,949....and with our 2021 average of 69 served each week....that means we should break 10,000 meals served at our next meal...Thanks be to God!

### **Basement Revamping**

Recently, a call-to-action took place at a monthly parish committee meeting and plans were presented to revamp the basement area. A committee met after 9am Mass on Sunday, January 10 and it was decided to look at the job portion-by-portion, checking in on a monthly (or so) basis.

The point of the project is to deepclean and spruce up the basement, which includes our larger hall, larger



kitchen, storage areas, stage, bomb shelter, and bomb shelter wings. The goal is to have a usable area with multiple assigned storage areas with appropriate shelving in a much more efficient manner. ### **Vestment & Cruet Blessing**



### 1st Communion at St. Mary's



### **Random Acts of Kindness**

If you look up a list of fun or wacky celebrations, some referred to as "National", you would find them celebrating anything from Make a Friend Day; last month's Week of Prayer for Christian Unity; all the way to Take Your Pants for a Walk Day; and Eat Ice Cream for Breakfast Day. Some are very meaningful and others are quite bizarre and just fun to smile about, and yes even celebrate... who wouldn't like ice cream for breakfast? Yes, I am going somewhere with this. February is the month which encourages us to carry out deeds during Random Acts of Kindness Week which is February 15-21. Who doesn't believe this world needs A LOT more kindness spread among us! The bible teaches: "By our purity, knowledge, patience, and kindness we have shown ourselves to be God's servants - by the Holy Spirit, by our true love," 2 Corinthians 6:6. share with you now some history and information I found when searching the internet.

Sometimes it's the smallest act that makes the biggest impact, something as simple as saying please or thank you can turn a day around, and make a life seem that much better. Random Acts of Kindness Day encourages you to get out there and be the light you want to see in the world.

History of Random Acts Of Kindness Day
Random Acts Of Kindness Day was first created in
Denver, Colorado in 1995, and nine years later it
spread to New Zealand in 2004. Random Acts of
Kindness can include just about anything, including
something as simple a taking a tray of muffins to
work. The idea behind this holiday is to make the
world a better place by spreading a little light
around. Lift someone up with your words, compli-

ment them on their appearance, all these things can help to really turn around someone who's having a bad day.

Additionally, research has shown that the very act of doing something for someone else gives us a chemical high, a higher one, in fact, than if something had been done for us. There was a wise man who once shared a concept "Do not think of those who are in need, such as panhandlers, as seeking charity. They are, instead, providing a service. A service that allows you to get your fix of feeling good while simultaneously paying someone for providing it." It may be a bit more open-minded than some people are ready for, but it certainly helps bring things into light!

How to celebrate Random Acts Of Kindness Day Random Acts of Kindness come in all forms, large and small, and how you choose to perform yours is entirely up to you. It can start with dropping a bit of change in the cup of the homeless person along the street, or considering the time of year, providing a warm blanket to see them through. You could take a friend out to lunch, for no other reason than that they're your friend. See someone looking down? Drop a hot coffee or tea on their desk with a smile, and tell them to have a great day. Even just smiling at someone and telling them to have a good day could have a profound impact. On Random Acts of Kindness Day, help yourself by helping others, the smile on their face and yours will prove it's all worth it.

I challenge everyone during the week from February 15-21 to do one random act of kindness every single day. Why not even go a step further and make it a family challenge (get your children involved!) or challenge your co-workers. I've provided a calendar on page 7 to give some ideas of things to do or you can search the internet for more ideas and free printable calendars. Hopefully those receiving your gesture will pass it on to another and them to yet another - what a wonderful world this could be!

PARISH ANNUAL MEETING – As discussed at our recent Parish Committee (Board) meeting, we have decided to postpone

the Annual Meeting from January to Sunday, February 28. We are waiting for a few things to flesh out at other parishes to give us a guide of what they are doing and how we should proceed. Since parish-wide meetings are the highest governing body in our parish, we need to make sure that as many people attend as possible.

REPORTS DUE – As our Annual meeting has been recalled, we are asking for reports from the heads of each parish society to be emailed to our parish committee chair, Elaine, or to Fr. Jason. We would like to have them by Sunday, February 7 – this way, they can be distributed and read before our Annual meeting, rather than at it.

PRE-LENT – Pre-Lent is an ancient Christian observance of devotion that was in preparation for the fasting and atonement of the Lenten Season. It allowed some to begin their fast even earlier. In this period, flowers were traditionally removed from the sanctuary, as were the Gloria and the Alleluia verse. Thematically, it really is in between the "green" of Jesus's ministry and

the "violet" of penance and the buildup of the case against Christ that is the Lenten Season. The rose-colored vestments show that thematic bridge in tone and in devotion.

THROAT BLESSING-Takes place today, optionally, after the conclusion of Holy Mass. Candles were blessed to honor the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord (Candlemas on February 2<sup>nd</sup> and throats may be blessed in honor of St. Blaise as a protection against ailments of the throat. His Day was honored on February 3<sup>rd</sup> and our parish tradition is to bless throats the Sunday after.




